Why an Advent Devotional?

It's the most wonderful time of the year! Well, according to singer-songwriter Andy Williams.

But what if you are a terrible gift-buyer? Or what if memories of tree decorating are only painful reminders of family feuds? And let's not even talk about the pressure we put on ourselves to make the holidays picture perfect!

It's pretty easy to get so wrapped up in getting everything ready that Christmas morning can sneak up on us and we end up feeling guilty for not having that warm, fuzzy feeling about baby Jesus on the one day we are supposed to be celebrating His birth!

We spend so much of the season creating our own little winter wonderlands: cookies, decorating, lights, candy, carols, parties. But what exactly are we doing to prepare spiritually? Most Christians agree that Christmas is about Jesus, yet few of our calendars reflect that priority.

What is this Devotional?

This Advent Season, Pioneer and Barlow Presbyterian Churches are here to help. We're offering this devotional as a guide to help you prepare spiritually to celebrate the first coming of Jesus (the baby), while eagerly awaiting the second coming of Jesus (the King), even as we experience the presence of Jesus (the Holy Spirit) in and among us now.



How Do I Use it?

We all suffer from "soul amnesia," forgetting who God is, what He's done for us from one day to the next. We must remind ourselves each year who Jesus is and why His birth is so miraculous—not because our minds don't know it, but because our hearts cease to be amazed by it! The saying goes that familiarity breeds contempt and, sadly, our hearts lose that sense of wonder.

So we invite you to allow this devotional to engage your heart, mind, body and soul as we begin the journey to Bethlehem once again.

Candles are big part of Advent tradition, and we light a candle each week to represent Hope, Preparation, Joy and Love. Their light reminds us: these holy promises overcome darkness.

So as you meditate on these devotions each day, we invite you to light a candle of your own to remind yourself that they are holy moments. You may even choose to sing a hymn or even copy a posture from the devotion: lifting hands, kneeling, or sitting with face down. However you choose to use this devotional, we pray that it will help you grow in your relationship with Jesus the Christ and with one another.

complacent as time has passed. And this has probably had an effect on the way we live our lives. How would you live your life if you knew Christ was coming back today!?


When Paul was writing to the Romans, he wanted them to get their lives in order, because he believed the time was short. He warned them to "remove your dark deeds like dirty

Even today, people who do reject the Gospel do so because the Word is misunderstood.


God's people are stubborn, and those who prefer darkness will not see the Word and the world for what they are.

Isaiah 6

It was in the year King Uzziah died[a] that I saw the Lord. He was sitting on a lofty throne, and the train of his robe filled the Temple. Attending him were mighty seraphim, each having six wings. With two wings they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. They were calling out to each other, "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of Heaven's Armies! The whole earth is filled with his glory!" Their voices shook the Temple to its foundations, and the entire building was filled with smoke. Then I said, "It's all over! I am doomed, for I am a sinful man. I have filthy lips, and I live among a people with filthy lips. Yet I have seen the King, the LORD of Heaven's Armies." Then one of the seraphim flew to me with a burning coal he had taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. He touched my lips with it and said, "See, this coal has touched your lips. Now your guilt is removed, and your sins are forgiven." Then I heard the Lord asking, "Whom should I send as a messenger to this people? (continued)

(continued) ... Who will go for us?" I said, "Here I am. Send me." And he said, "Yes, go, and say to this people, Listen carefully, but do not understand. Watch closely, but learn nothing.' Harden the hearts of these people. Plug their ears and shut their eyes. That way, they will not see with their eyes, nor hear with their ears, nor understand with their hearts and turn to me for healing." Then I said, "Lord, how long will this go on?" And he replied, "Until their towns are empty, their houses are deserted, and the whole country is a wasteland: until the LORD has sent everyone away, and the entire land of Israel lies deserted. If even a tenth—a remnant—survive. it will be invaded again and burned. But as a terebinth or oak tree leaves a stump when it is cut down, so Israel's stump will be a holy seed."





December 9

Even if it was written in the Scriptures long ago, you can be sure it was written for us. God wants the combination of his steady, constant calling and warm, personal counsel in Scripture to come to characterize us, keeping us alert to whatever he will do next.

May our dependably steady and warmly personal God develop maturity in you so that you get along with each other as well as Jesus gets along with us all. Then we'll be a choir-not our voices only, but our very lives singing in harmony in a stunning anthem to the God and Father of our Master Jesus!

So, reach out and welcome one another to God's glory. Jesus did it; now you do it!

Romans 15:4-13

Such things were written in the Scriptures long ago to teach us. And the Scriptures give us hope and encouragement as we wait patiently for God's promises to be fulfilled. 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
And again: People of all nations, celebrate God! All colors and races. give hearty praise!

Why are you downcast, my soul? Within two weeks of hearing we are losing another sisterin-law to cancer, we heard today that she has passed.


But in the mist of our sorrow, we can praise God that he has taken her to rest high on his mountain before she had many weeks of suffering and pain.


December 15

We all need to come together to show others the right way.


As God's servants it is our responsibility to show others the way to the light and to continuously be there for one another.

Go out and be the light.





December 21

This is the story of the healing of the man who was blind from birth.

Here we go again! So many times the Bible points out the lack of understanding we have of God's plan through his son Jesus (God in the form of man). Jesus' followers, like so many of us today, looked at the poor, infirmed and downtrodden as people who were - are - being punished for their and their parents' sinful lives.

Where do the disciples (or we, for that matter) get off condemning anyone for being what all of us are: sinners who fall short of God's grace?

I believe that the truly faithful one in this story is the blind man. He had no clue what Jesus was doing when he started applying "spittle" to his eyes. How many of us would have stood



still for that? And when Jesus instructed him to "Go, wash at the pool of Siloam," he didn't hear "Go, wash at the pool of Siloam and your sight will be restored." No, through faith he simply, without question, did what Jesus told him to do.

Matthew 1:18-25

Luke 2:8-20


That night there were shepherds staying in the fields nearby, guarding their flocks of sheep. Suddenly, an angel of the Lord appeared among them, and the radiance of the Lord's glory surrounded them. They were terrified, but the angel reassured them. "Don't be afraid!" he said. "I bring you good news that will bring great joy to all people. The Savior—yes, the Messiah, the Lord—has been born today in Bethlehem, the city of David! And you will recognize him by this sign: You will find a baby wrapped snugly in strips of cloth, lying in a manger." Suddenly, the angel was joined by a vast host of others—the armies of heaven—praising God and saying, "Glory to God in highest heaven,mand peace on earth to those with whom God is pleased." When the angels had returned to heaven, the shepherds said to each other, "Let's go to Bethlehem! Let's see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."They hurried to the village and found Mary and Joseph. And there was the baby, lying in the manger. After seeing him, the shepherds told everyone what had happened and what the angel had said to them about this child. All who heard the shepherds' story were astonished, but Mary kept all these things in her heart and thought about them often. The shepherds went back to their flocks, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen. It was just as the angel had told them.



This passage reminds us of two important truths: Jesus fulfilled prophesy through his actions here on earth and in doing so he brought great light into this world.

One way we know Jesus was the true Messiah is that he brought life to prophesies of Isaiah and others. Those actions established his credentials as the Son of God, the savior of the Jewish people, and savior of all who believe in Him.

It was important for Matthew and other writers of the Gospels to point out connections with prophesy because Jesus was not the type of Messiah the Jewish people expected. They looked for an all-powerful king to deliver them from Roman persecution. Jesus did not fit their expectations. He was born in a stable, worked as a carpenter, preached love and forgiveness, and chose to die on a cross rather than lead a rebellion. It took some convincing for the Jewish people to see that Jesus was the fulfillment of prophesy. Many did not believe then, and others still do not believe to this day.



But the light of Christ keeps drawing us back to the Way. That light always shines through. It lifts us from the darkness of our fear and shines into the corners of our lives we would rather not see. It is the light of love. That light leads us from despair to hope, from confusion to understanding, from hatred to compassion, and from emptiness to joy.

When Jesus was born in that stable, the light of a star came to shine over him, and that same light became brighter until its brilliance overpowered darkness once and for all. That light is our light if we choose to claim it. We just need to turn from the darkness of our lives toward the light of Jesus, and He will do the rest.

Matthew 4:14-16

This fulfilled what God said through the prophet Isaiah: "In the land of Zebulun and of Naphtali, beside the sea, beyond the Jordan River, in Galilee where so many Gentiles live. the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light. And for those who lived in the land where death casts its shadow, a light has shined."



Then from each black, accursed mouth the cannon thundered in the South, And with the sound the carols drowned of peace on earth, good will to men! And in despair I bowed my head; 'There is no peace on earth,' I said; For hate is strong, and mocks the song of peace on earth, good will to men!'

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow penned those words on Christmas Day in 1864. They're part of a poem, Christmas Bells, probably more familiar to you as "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." Well, most of the poem, anyway, because these two verses were removed. They're not particularly light hearted and Christmassy.

What they were, however, was tremendously meaningful for Longfellow, reflective of the times in which he lived. During this most holy Season, we'd be wise to revisit their message.

In 1864, America was about as contentious as it gets, bedeviled by the Civil War. North vs. South, Confederate vs. Union, and, worst of all, brother vs. brother. Longfellow was a poet of peace and had long supported abolitionism. He hoped for a resolution before war could overtake the land, but he didn't get his wish. Instead, he got so much more than he expected.



In 1861, the war opened and his wife was fatally burned. In 1863, his eldest son was wounded on the battlefield of that very war he lamented. The times in which he lived took a toll on this gentle, peaceful man, silencing even his poet's soul. "I can make no record of these days," he wrote. "Better leave them wrapped in silence."

But in the fall of 1864, with Abraham Lincoln's re-election and a welcome scent of peace on the wind, Longfellow renewed his hope for reconciliation and wrote Christmas Bells.

There's a message in this story for us today, I believe. Longfellow's dark times were not unlike ours, with acid-tongued rhetoric dripping from the mouths of politicians, opinion leaders, and yes, even the media. Our country today may well be dipped in despair, where no one seems able to collaborate and blame is rampant. Forget about accountability; it's always someone else's fault. Spirited rhetoric will always exist — and should. It's the vitriolic rhetoric that has no place in a civilized society. Our society.

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Like Longfellow, it's enough to strike us dumb, wrapped in silence. So I ask you this: Are we on the cusp of another Civil War, however different the battles? Is it Democrat vs. Republican, Conservative vs. Liberal, Right vs. Left, Legislative vs. Executive, Environment vs. Business, 1% vs. 99%, Christian vs. Muslim vs. Jew vs. Atheist vs. Buddhist? Where does it end?

Longfellow wrote, once the war subsided: "I have only one desire; and that is for harmony, and a frank and honest understanding between North and South." He craved unity.

I believe many voices today ARE struck dumb, as Longfellow's was, wrapped in silence. But the scent of peace that arrives as we await the birth of the Christ Child promises hope, always hope, that the silence will be broken.

Longfellow's poem didn't end on a bleak note, however poignant and stark. It ended with this:

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: 'God is not dead; nor doth he sleep!
The Wrong shall fail, The Right prevail,
With peace on earth, good will to men!'

A few months later, Lincoln was sworn in. The president said, at that historic juncture: "On this occasion four years ago, all thoughts were directed to a coming Civil War. All feared it. All tried to prevent it. Both parties opposed war. But one of them would make war rather than let the nation live. And the other would accept war, rather than let it die. ...

"With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right — as God gives us to see the right — let us strive on to finish the work we are in. Let us heal the nation's wounds. Let us do all possible to get and keep a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations."

Yes, let's. It's time to break silence and, like Longfellow's bells, drown out divisive rhetoric with civility and collaboration. In this most holy of times, let us live and breathe peace on earth, good will to all.

Lord, may I feel the pealing of bells in my heart, see them in my works, and hear them in my words. Peace on earth, good will to all.
